THE LORD'S "SERVANT SUBSTITUTE" IN ISAIAH IN MONTHLY FORM

The Days of the Month Are Coordinated with the Verses of the Four Servant Songs in Isaiah 53, 42, 49, & 50.

ISAIAH 53. (See Isaiah 53's three-verse Introduction below at Days 13-15, Isaiah 52:13-15.)

<u>Verse</u>: & Day 1; "But who has really believed what we have heard? And to whom has the arm of the LORD been really revealed?

- <u>2</u>. For the Servant grew up before the LORD like a raw shrub & like a root out of dry ground. He had no special face or form that we should look at him; there was nothing in his appearance that we should desire him.
- 3. He was, in fact & finally, despised & rejected by others, a man of suffering & acquainted with grief; and as one from whom others hide their faces he was despised & we held him of no account whatsoever."
- 4. "But really! <u>He</u> himself took on himself <u>our</u> deep weaknesses & <u>he</u> carried <u>our</u> sicknesses, though we thought of him as stricken & struck down by God & that was why he was so afflicted.
- 5. But he was wounded for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, & by his stripes we are healed.
- <u>6</u>. <u>All we</u> like sheep have gone astray, <u>we</u> have <u>all</u> turned to our own way, & the LORD has laid on <u>him</u> the iniquity of us all."
- Z. "He was oppressed, & he was afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; like a <u>lamb</u> that is led to the slaughter & like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, he did not open his mouth. THE LAMB [] ²⁹
- <u>8</u>. By a perversion of justice, in fact, he was taken away. <u>But who could have imagined his future?</u> For he was cut off from the land of the living, stricken—<u>for</u> the transgression of My people.
 - <u>9</u>. They made his grave with the wicked & his tomb with the rich, though he had done no violence & there as no deceit in his mouth."
- 10. "Yet it was the will of the LORD to crush him with pain. But when you [!] make his life the sacrifice for sin he shall see his offspring, he shall prolong his days, & through him the will of the LORD shall finally triumph. 50 B
- 11. Out of his anguish he shall see light & find satisfaction—through those, namely, who come to know him. In sum, The Righteous One, My Servant, shall make many righteous, & he himself shall bear their iniquities.
- <u>12</u>. Therefore I will assign him the very many for his portion, & numberless shall be his catch. Why? Because he poured himself out to death & numbered himself with the rebellious. Yes, in exactly this way, <u>he himself took on himself</u> the sins of oh so many & made intercession for the transgressors."

<u>ISAIAH 52:13</u>-15 (These three verses, Isaiah 53's <u>introductory</u> verses, are here coordinated with the days of the month.)

13. "Look! My Servant shall triumph! He shall be exalted & lifted up & shall be very high.

14. But meanwhile, just as then there were so many who were appalled by him [Hebrew: "by you,!" alika], for so marred was his appearance, beyond human semblance, & his form beyond that of mortals—

<u>15</u>. —just so shall he startle many nations <u>now</u>. Kings shall shut their mouths because of him, for that which had never been told them before they shall now actually see, & that which they had never heard before they shall now actually ponder." (Isaiah 53:1ff., at the top of the page, follows this introduction.)
